## Samaritan Inns rename Harvard Inn, The Clark Inn

**WASHINGTON, DC**- At this afternoon's ribbon-cutting ceremony, Samaritan Inns' President, Larry Huff, announced that the inn housing its new Women with Children Program will be named the Clark Inn, after the late A. James Clark.

Mr. Clark was a philanthropist and former Chairman and CEO of the Clark Construction Group. He adopted Samaritan Inns over 25 years ago and became fully engaged in its growth, livelihood, positioning in the community, and the residents they served. He led the initial acquisition and renovation of its facilities, and his teams have been involved in every major program and facility initiative. He also served on the Board of Directors for Samaritan Inns.

Jim Clark adopted Samaritan Inns over 25 years ago and became fully engaged in our growth, our positioning in the community, our direction, our livelihood, and the people we serve. He led the initial acquisition and renovation of our major facilities, and his teams have been involved in every major program and facility initiative. He served on the Governing Board of Samaritan Inns for several years.

The ribbon cutting for the Clark Inn and the new Women with Children Program was completed by his widow, Mrs. Alice Clark, and daughter, Courtney Pastrick of the Clark Family Foundation.

The new Women with Children Program will create a safe home where mothers recovering from substance abuse can receive treatment and family services while establishing a foundation for long-term independent living
